The project areas, located in Lake County, Illinois, lie within the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) region boundary. The Brownlee acquisition (parcel# 0326300007) is located in Wadsworth, Illinois in Newport Township. The Lotus Country acquisitions (parcel #s 0125100002, 0125100011, 0125100013, 0125100008, and 0125100009) are located in an unincorporated area in Antioch Township, Illinois.

# 4. Project Description

This project seeks carbon credits for forested parcels that have been recently acquired by the Lake County Forest Preserve District (the District). Since 1958, the District has protected the natural and cultural heritage of Lake County with holdings of more than 31,300 acres across 65 preserves. Each year, the preserves provide more than 3.5 million visitors with opportunities to exercise, relax, and spend quality time outdoors in peaceful, natural settings. The preserves are free and open to the public every day and contribute to the health and well-being of all in Lake County. The goal of the District is to acquire, develop, and maintain land in its natural state; to protect and preserve the flora, fauna, and scenic beauty; for the education, pleasure, and recreation of the public; and for flood control and water management. The District became aware of the CFC Preservation Project opportunity in 2022.

The total forested project area acreage is estimated to be 35.0 acres, which includes 11.28 acres of the Brownlee parcel and 23.71 acres of the Lotus Country acquisitions. The first Lotus Country property to be acquired (in summer 2024), was zoned as Open Space and Agricultural. It was acquired because of its valuable ecological features, namely, the largest heron and egret rookery in the county. The second Lotus Country acquisition closed in May 2025 and was also zoned as agricultural. The second Lotus Country property was acquired for its ecological value and to increase habitat connectivity. The Brownlee property was zoned as suburban estate and was purchased in summer 2023.

# 5. Project Impacts

This project will protect approximately 35.0 acres of forested parcels, including one adjacent to an elementary school. The protected trees will provide ecosystem services, which are the direct and indirect benefits of ecosystems, including:

- enhancing plant and wildlife habitat: healthy habitats provide the framework and conditions necessary to sustain ecologically significant plant and wildlife populations, as well as biodiversity;
- stormwater interception: trees (and all wooded habitats) slow rainfall reaching the ground and can reduce stormwater runoff that might otherwise affect nearby developed areas;
- carbon sequestration: natural forests and urban trees capture and store (sequester) atmospheric carbon dioxide directly and indirectly;
- improved air quality: trees produce oxygen, reduce airborne particulates such as dust, pollen, ash and smoke, and remove air pollutants such as ozone and nitrogen oxides;
- preserve and enhance community aesthetics: trees and forests have important aesthetic value, they add beauty to their surrounding landscapes by softening and screening development, contributing to the character of the community and environment, and helping maintain or improve property values;
- provide individual and community health and wellness benefits: time spent in nature has quantitative impacts on personal and community health, including reduced stress and anxiety;

improvements in chronic health conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes; reduced rates of asthma and other respiratory conditions; etc.

Ecosystem services are generated annually and will increase over time due to inflation, benefiting area residents forever.

#### 6. Additional Information

Nearly twenty years ago, the conservation community in Lake County developed a shared goal of conserving 20% of the county's land area as open space by 2030. These three acquisitions contribute to the District's progress toward that goal. This project also supports goals outlined in the Illinois Forest Action Plan (2020-2030) and the Chicago Region Trees Initiative.

The Brownlee parcel is included in IDNR's Conservation Opportunity Area in Illinois' Wildlife Action Plan and contains Species in Greatest Need of Conservation (SGNC). The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) includes the parcel in its Conservation Opportunity and Regional Conservation Priority maps, and it is within IDNR's Upper Des Plaines River Corridor Conservation Opportunity Area. The Lotus Country parcels are located in the Upper Fox River Watershed and in the IDNR Lake-McHenry Wetland Complex Conservation Opportunity Area. The Lotus Country Conservation Preserve is important because the rookery provides habitat for large numbers of breeding individuals in one place. Birds are incredibly important to the environment and play key roles in ecosystem maintenance.

This project is part of the Chicago Region Carbon Credit Program and complements other tree preservation projects in the seven-metro counties coordinated by the Chicago Region Trees Initiative.




